YEAR 7 & 8 SCIENCE ROADSHOW

At the end of the training camp, 23 players out of the 89 who attended the camp were selected to play for the Hurricanes Under 18 team in a tournament. Hugh made the team, and played against the Blues at Owen Delany Park, in Taupo.

NEWS FROM THE TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT

Technology is everywhere and it has made itself part of every aspect of our lives today, and the students who understand it, are the ones to survive in post-secondary education and the business world. The students of this generation are considered technological learners. They learn best being more interactive, and Technology is what helps them do that.

DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

The digital world is fast moving and ever changing. Young people need to keep ahead of this change, understand the theory and science behind the technologies they use, and be able to participate in the digital world as the creators – not just users – of innovations and inventions. Our students need to be prepared now to adapt to technology and jobs that have not yet been invented – robotics, artificial intelligence, nanotechnology, etc. Digital Technologies/Hangarau Matihiko equip our young people for this digital future.

To prepare our students for the future, Wairoa College rolled out a brand new Digital Technologies Course this year. To comply with the NZ Technology Curriculum, two new technological areas, Computational Thinking for Digital Technologies and Designing and Developing Digital Outcomes were introduced in Years 7 to 10. Digital Technologies is an option subject in Years 10 to 13 with a wide range of Unit Standards and Achievement Standards on offer to meet the needs of the students. By offering this extensive Digital Technologies course, Wairoa College is providing local students the same learning opportunities as students from far bigger schools.

Digital Technologies is taught in the school's new state of the art computer lab by Mr Johann Oosthuizen Head of Faculty Techology.



HARD MATERIALS

In the Hard Materials course we aim to give students the opportunity to create something which is personally or culturally meaningful to them. The students enjoy learning how to use tools and processes, but are also learning how to manage their own learning and beginning to understand what can be achieved with patience, perseverance and purpose.

Hard Materials focuses on the development of practical skills as well as developing products that are fit for a purpose. Students learn to think through problems and engage with others (stakeholders) to find solutions.

In the workshop students are challenged to learn techniques and skills that will enable them to solve problems. This is a dangerous environment which means that along with learning problem solving skills, students are learning valuable lessons in how to keep themselves out of harm's way. Guided by the New Zealand curriculum, our students are growing their skills in our wellequipped material workshop. Our specialist Mr Thomas provides exciting opportunities for students in Years 9 to 13 to engage in creative and hands-on learning experiences.

Our Hard Materials students develop their knowledge of tools required to safely process different materials. They also develop their technological literacy through the integration of project planning, brief development, outcome development and evaluation.



NEWS FROM THE TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT

FOOD

Under the guidance of Mesdames Michelle McDonald, Lynda Wilson, Shelley Murphy and Ms Karen Hayward our students develop real life practical skills in the food technology suites. This includes safety, hygiene, budgeting, planning, creating and preparing foods. They learn to cook practical everyday foods on a budget to more creative and innovative experimentation. The Junior Food Technology course ranges from identifying equipment and safety procedures in the classroom through to producing dishes they can replicate in the future. This is to build and extend healthy food options. Our Junior students are also taught the benefits of making healthy food choices. The Level 2 Cafe Culture course is an industry based course which gives students the skills to work in food based employment. They learn the importance of personal hygiene and food safety while preparing cafe quality food. Students also have the opportunity to learn barista skills. The Level 3 Catering course offers Barista, professional cookery and real life community

catering experiences to our Senior students.

TEXTILES

The textiles room at Wairoa College is a creative space where students learn skills to design and make products that are fit for a purpose. Under the skillful guidance of Ms Karen Hayward and Mrs Shelley Murphy, our students are working through the technology process, encouraging independence and problem solving. The students progress from Years 7 and 8 where they learn the basics of the sewing machine, to Year 13 where they can design and make their own garments. It's not always easy in a workshop, computer lab, food technology or textiles room, but with a bit of hard work and support from their teachers, students can achieve success.

COMMUNITY NEWS

A MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE:

We have a child with measles in Hawkes Bay. Measles is a serious, highly infectious viral disease that is easy to prevent through immunisation. We suggest you release the following information again to your whanau and wider community.

If your child has had two doses of the Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) immunisation they are protected.

As there is a high chance that measles could spread throughout Hawke's Bay, we urge you take the following steps to make sure your child is protected:

Check your child has had two doses of the MMR immunisation.

- o If your child only has a record of receiving one dose of MMR they should have another as soon as possible
- o If your child has no record of MMR immunisation they should have one dose now and a second dose FOUR weeks later.
- o Immunisation is FREE from your GP or Practice Nurse.

Please make sure you have a copy of your child's immunisation certificate, so you can show this to their school if required. If your child has contact with a person with confirmed measles they may be asked to keep away from school for up to two weeks if there is no record of them having been immunised against MMR.

Immunisation is highly recommended as it protects your child and helps prevent the spread of infection in the community when an outbreak occurs.
