Message From Our Deputy Principal

NCEA QUALIFICATION FEES DUE



NCEA qualification fees are now due to be paid at the school office. This fee is to be paid by all Year 11 - 13 students sitting NCEA qualifications. Year 9 - 10 students who are sitting external NCEA exams will also incur a fee.

NCEA fees are different to school fees and the money you pay is forwarded onto NZQA. Students will not be credited with the qualifications they achieve this year until the fee is paid. **NCEA**

fees are \$76.70 per student, however, **financial assistance is available** for whanau who meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Receive a Work and Income or Study Link benefit (Fee reduces to \$20 for one student, \$30 for 2 or more students)
- Earn a total family income that would qualify your whanau to a Community Services Card (Fee reduces to \$20 for one student, \$30 for 2 or more students)
- The total fee paid for all students would exceed \$200 (Fee will be capped to \$200)

To receive Financial Assistance you will need to complete a form which is available from the school office. If you wish to use your automatic payment to pay this fee you will need to let the office staff know.

All NCEA fees are due to be paid in full by Friday 17th August.

MPI Forestry Scholarships applications open now!

It's an exciting time in the forestry sector. Technology and science are changing the way we do things and is paving the way to provide

opportunities for rewarding and lifelong careers. We need people who can work with robotics, help develop new forestry products and processes, and take them to the market.

The Ministry of Primary Industries (MPI) is offering four scholarships for the 2019 academic year for qualifying Māori and female students enrolling in the Bachelor of Forestry Science or Bachelor of Engineering (Hons) in Forest Engineering at the University of Canterbury. This will increase to 18 scholarships over the next three years.

Applications are open now until 31 August 2018.

The new Forestry Scholarships - Ngā Karahipi Uru Rākau - aim to grow the capability of the forestry sector and increase the number of women and Māori in the industry.

Successful winners will recieve:

- \$8,000 a year for 4 years (the length of the degree) to help with tuition fees and living costs, and

DEPARTMENT FOCUS: YEAR 7 & 8

Welcome to the Year 7 and 8 Department!

Our Department consists of seven classrooms - three Year 7 classes, three Year 8 classes, plus a Bi-lingual Year 7 and 8 composite class.

During Term 3, Mr Johann Oosthuizen is teaching Digital Information Technology one hour per week in Year 7 learning classes assisted by their classroom teachers. In Term 4 he will be working in Year 8 classes.

THE YEAR 7 AND 8 COURTYARD

The Year 7 and 8 courtyard is for use by our students only. Thanks to Toby Taylor and our Caretaker Tim McCarthy, the students now have a basketball hoop with a backboard to practice their skills. There are also two netball goals on a netball court, and hand ball grids. On occasions we are able to bring out our giant chess set, gutter boards, stilts and ropes, using monitors/staff to assist with this. We encourage our students to stay within this area unless they are using the adventure playground structure beside the gym.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND SPORT

We are very fortunate to have Wairoa College Sports' coordinator Mr Toby Taylor. Toby works very closely with our Department to ensure that our students have opportunities to participate in various sports activities including Clay Target shooting.

A small group of ten students are privileged to be part of a Sport Hawkes Bay programme sponsored by the Wairoa Young Achievers' Trust. Every alternate Friday the ten students either travel down to the Sports' Park in Hawkes Bay or the coaches travel to Wairoa College to work with them here.

In Term 1, a visiting Tennis coach took the students through an amazing five week programme of tennis skills. Coming up this term we have got the Hawks' Basketball coaching workshops over five weeks. In the pipeline we also have Football/Soccer coaching, a Water Safety Programme and Volvo Sailing which is two, one day sailing coaching workshops using Optimist yachts and support from Wairoa Yacht club. Other Wairoa District Schools sports events our students will be participating in, are Cross Country organised by Ohuka School on September 4 and Athletics organised by Wairoa Primary in Term 4 on November 28.

THE ARTS

Throughout the year, students also are given the chance to work with Edible/Wearable Arts (Ms Hayward), Speech and Writing competitions and the Arts' Festival being organised this year by St Joseph's Primary. The theme is 'People Around the World' celebrating diversity through dance, wearable arts and drama. We have some very talented students in these areas and it is pleasing to see many taking up these opportunities to participate.

This term our Department is developing oral language skills and confidence with speeches about Biodiversity culminating in a final contest of speeches on 30 August and an opportunity to compete in the Hillmac Electrical Speech Contest on 6 September to be held at the Aquarium in Napier.


