MESSAGE FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

During the holidays, Taurion and Hinehea-Rose our Head Boy and Girl attended the ANZAC ceremony at the War Memorial. It is important that our younger generation continue to remember and understand what those before them sacrificed. It was heartening to see such a great turn out.

Term 2 is looking to be a very busy term. Winter sport is underway, a big thank you to all managers and coaches who give their time to help our students. Without your assistance our students would not have the opportunity to play sport.

As mentioned in the last newsletter, Term 2 is where you can make the biggest difference towards your learning. Seniors go after those credits, aim for merit and excellence. You can achieve top results if you put the work in. We are tracking on a regular basis how students are progressing. I was very pleased last term with the number of students who are striving for personal excellence.

This week in assembly Ms Mahy went over the WAI point system for Year 9 and 10. Students who pass assessments are awarded with WAI points. They strive throughout the year to gain as many as they can so they can attain their Year 9 or 10 diploma. They are also able to gain merit and excellence subject and level endorsements if they are achieving at the higher levels. Students are encouraged to keep track of their WAI points and set themselves goals.

I would like to remind parents that we do have a school uniform. Please do not let your children go to school wearing incorrect uniform. The uniform shop is well stocked with jackets, jerseys, shorts and shirts. The uniform shop is open from 1.15pm-1.45pm Monday to Thursday. The school jacket is a plain black zip jacket that is warm and looks smart. The only school shoe is a black shoe/sneaker that covers the toes. No jandals, sandals or gumboots are to be worn. Students have this week to get their uniform sorted and then consequences will be given. Students can see a Senior Leader with a note from home for a temporary uniform pass. We would like students to wear the Wairoa College uniform with pride. Please support us in trying to do this. If you need help in sorting uniform please contact the office.

Currently school starts with whanau time at 8.45am and then period 1 at 9am. From next week period 1 will start at 8.45am and whanau class will follow this. It is very important that students are in class ready to start their learning at 8.45am. If they are late you will be contacted. Students should not be arriving at school and then heading to the supermarket if it means they are late to class. This is not an acceptable excuse.

We are very fortunate thanks to Jane Body and Fruit in Schools that we are receiving fruit for all students at school from this week. Eating healthy is essential for the well-being and concentration of our learners. Year 7 and 8 students had benefited from this before and now we are very excited that all students can benefit.

I have included for you in this newsletter the Strategic Plan for Wairoa College 2018-2020. These are the goals that over three years we are striving to achieve. With each of these goals we also have annual goals that will support us to reach our targets. As a school I have to report to the Ministry on our progress towards these goals on the 1st March each year.

For us to achieve these goals we will be consulting with students, staff, whanau and community with our curriculum review, on how we can better transition students into our school and other reviews. Strategic Plan for Wairoa College 2018-2022

Goal 1: To improve Student Achievement:

Develop a broad, relevant and stimulating learning environment ensuring that every student realises their highest academic potential and is equipped with essential skills and values for life beyond school. Students set and achieve challenging personal goals. Student progress is regularly measured, monitored and reported to students and caregivers. Achievement is consistently and deliberately recognised and celebrated. All students achieve at least NCEA Level 2 before leaving school.

Goal 2: Curriculum content and delivery

The curriculum and related pedagogical practices are reviewed annually to ensure successful pathways for all students. Close attention is paid to the vision, principles, values and key competencies of the NZ Curriculum. Students are taught in a culturally inclusive manner and the learning is a partnership between teacher and students (Ako – teacher as learner and learner as teacher). We offer a creative, diverse curriculum that celebrates learning.

Attendance

The Senior Management Team are continuing to focus on attendance for the remainder of the year with the aim of achieving the 85% target for all students.

The simple rationale for this is that attendance and academic success are linked.

For many years we have seen that the students with high attendance are succeeding with their courses.

We also accept that students will be away for reasons and we would like caregiver support to ensure all students can be accounted for throughout the school day by notifying the school of their child's absence.

Our actions

The school will be contacting caregivers when the school receives no notification of an absence when our roll checks indicate a student has been away.

For those who have attended some classes and have intermittent absences without reason throughout the day there will be a consequence. This will be in the form of a lunch time or after school detention. Caregivers will be notified of this.

Late students, for school or classes, will also have a consequence. This will also be in the form of a detention.

We will also continue to acknowledge students who have achieved 100% attendance throughout the term in our house and full school assemblies.

Reporting

We will also be reporting the overall attendance trends and patterns to caregivers via the newsletter on a regular basis.

Caregivers are aware that students need to have an 85% attendance rate to be eligible for sports teams and / or school trips. Mr Hamblyn is willing to work with individual students to ensure this is achieved. Where there is an issue with this it is up to the students to take responsibility to make a time to meet with Mr Hamblyn to sort this out.

The College's first ever volleyball team came together to compete in the Hawke's Bay mixed senior secondary schools competition. They came 3rd in their division. Well Done!






